GO THE EXTRA MILE

As a teenager, I partied, smoked pot, drank beer, skipped school. I still believed in God, and I prayed to Him. But I became a rebel against authority. Even in the Army, I still had this thing in my head about God. Off and on, I would read the Bible and pray. But was I willing to give up this sinful life?

After three years, I was honorably discharged and found a wife, Dawn. I joined the New York Army National Guard, moved up in the ranks, and retired after 20 years. Still praying to God, but not committed. After retirement, I decided I would spend time studying the Bible again.

As time went on, it was like I was spiritually under attack. Like the devil himself was going after the people closest to me and coming at me from all different angles. My wife, in particular, was even telling me she fell out of love with me.

We worked on both of our issues together. We got back together and things were going good so we started planning vacations. Until her health started to decline. It was Ovarian Cancer. We set an appointment with the doctor to look at treatment options, but the next morning I found her on the couch not breathing. After calling 911,

I performed CPR until the ambulance arrived. It was too late. Why did this happen? I didn't call out to God for anything. I wasn't angry with Him, but I wasn't calling out to him like I used to. Depression is worse than anything I have ever encountered. The emptiness just got bigger until that's all I thought about. I lay in bed one night and started to cry out to God; the tears would not stop. I asked God if there are true Christians out there that I could get to know and trust. God answered. A good friend, Edwin, moved into a house not too far from me. He told me about this church he found called Crosstown and invited me to check it out.

I didn't come at first, but he asked me again so for him I did. I decided to keep coming, not understanding what was going on. Everyone was so nice and welcoming, which was a change from what I was used to. One morning, I prayed still asking what my purpose was without Dawn. I asked Christ, "I'm here, and use me how you see fit." Then I get this call. It was a man named Tom Tartaglia from Crosstown. He said there was a baptism on Sunday and he needed help sawing and fitting wood over the tub to help keep the water warm. I told him, "sure, I'd be happy to." After the call, I looked up and said, "well I can't say no after what I just prayed for."

On Easter Sunday 2021, I was baptized in the same tub I helped Tom cover. Now I'm a member and volunteering. I have a new purpose.

GOD IS THE GOAL

As a young teen, I remember having questions about God, but no one in my circle talked about Him. So, I went through my teenage years playing, drinking, and doing things I shouldn't have. I was absolutely a mess until I was 30. Nothing changed. I married at a very young age, and we had a child. I got divorced very young. I got remarried and had four kids, and things weren't good.

Then at work, I went to the day shift. Looking back, it was God's divine guidance at that time. He dropped me in the middle of two Christian men on the day shift. For two solid years, I heard about the Word of God.

I bought myself a small Bible to put in

my pocket. I kept reading it. It made sense to me. But, I was looking at these men who lived a different life than I, and my conclusion was, "that all sounds good, but I can't do that. There's no way I can live like that." I couldn't. That's the one time in my life I was right. I couldn't, but God could help me live like that. It's like I went to bed with the mouth of a sailor and a drinking problem that was going to kill me. And I woke up the next day, and my mouth was clean. God just took that desire. He reached down in me and threw it to the wind.

But I had a 15-year-old son I had raised to be just like me. I had a 13-year-old daughter headed for nothing but trouble. Two younger kids. A wife. Their lives were just flipped upside down. Nobody was happy. My wife left and came back in about seven months. You can't go into a situation, snap your fingers, and say, "done." You pay the price, and I had everything coming for me. I deserved it. I knew I was the bad guy. And God didn't let me escape. It took a long time to heal. It took me a lot of time to undo the injuries I had done.

We're approaching our 50th anniversary only because of the Lord. My oldest daughter gave her life to Christ within a year of my salvation. My oldest son, almost 50 now and rebellious just like I was, he proclaimed that he's a Christian.

I prayed for my wife for 25 years. I prayed for my son for 30 years. And now they're both saved. It was in God's time, not mine. I've had liver cancer for 15 years. Recently, doctors said I was too sick for treatment, but I don't look at it like most people. I don't rise and say I'm going to fight this thing. I'm in God's hands. He has a path for me, and I will do my best to be close to Him, be obedient, and learn as much about who He is.

God broke my heart, broke down my spirit, humbled me, and changed my life. What an amazing, sovereign, wonderful, merciful, loving Father. I will never get over what He did for me. How could I?

I know God has provided me peace and strength in my many worries, and I also know he has surrounded me with so many experienced men and women of God to help me help students.

My biggest takeaway joining the leader team is this: don't be afraid to ask God for help and don't be afraid to ask other believers for guidance.

We're going to mess up and disappoint someone (I do it all the time), so own it, bring your convictions to God, repent, apologize. Never stop trying to be more like Jesus and pursue His glory.




